Howard S. Judd, 57, Former Resident, Dies In Crash

Howard Stanley Judd, 57, son of the late Mr. And Mrs. Albert L. Judd, former residents of 88 South Main Street, this town, was killed in an automobile accident yesterday afternoon in New Jersey. Details of the accident were unreported here last evening.

Mr. Judd was educated in the local schools, graduating from the local high school. He attended Exeter Academy and was graduated from Yale Sheffield School in 1918.

In the First World War he was an aerial photographer and was commissioned first lieutenant.

Later he went to New York and then to New Jersey, where he had been living in Cranbury, N.J. He was an insurance broker and only recently became interested in the real estate business. He was affiliated with the Massachusetts Mutual Insurance Company in New York City for over 30 years.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Howard Stanley Judd; two sons, Howard Stanley Judd, Jr., and Rodney Layton Judd; one granddaughter, Mrs. John Filcox of Fayettesville, N.C., and one grandson John Filcox, III, and one sister, Lucelia W. Judd of 88 South Main Street, Wallingford.

Edward M. Judd Passes Away

Prominent Citizen of Borough Will be Buried Thursday in New Britain

After an illness of long standing Judge Edward M. Judd passed away Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock at his late home, 169 South Main Street. He was in his seventieth year. He is survived by a wife; a daughter, Mrs. Charles G. Phelps, a son Edward P. Judd, of New York. He also leaves a brother, Albert D. Judd and a sister, Mrs. H. H. Martin, both of Wallingford.

The funeral will be held Thursday noon from the house and the body will then be removed to New Britain for interment, leaving here on the 1:20 train.

Although a sufferer for years with kidney troubles it was not until last July that Judge Judd's final illness compelled him to remain indoors. Since July 20 he had been confined to his room and life was despaired of on several occasions. Although a great sufferer Judge Judd bore his ailments with fortitude but toward the last he often remarked that death would be welcomed. He had been unconscious since last Sunday and died without regaining consciousness. Sunday his attending physician spent the greater part of the day and night at his bedside and the end was momentarily expected. The immediate cause of death was cerebrae hemorrhage following neuralgia of the heart, which has been the malady during the past summer.

The judge was known throughout the state as a retired manufacturer and court official. He was judge of the borough police court at the time of his death. The sympathy of the entire community will be extended to the family.

Edward Morton Judd, third son of Deacon Morton Judd was born November 11, 1837 in New Britain, Conn., and proved himself a worthy member of the honorable family to which he belonged. He attended the schools of New Britain and spent three years in the High school there. At the age of eighteen he, too, entered the manufacturing world. In 1856 he began the manufacture of the first metal curtain fixtures (of which he was also the patentee), and in 1861 removed to New Haven, the firm becoming E. M. Judd & Co. Upon his location in New Haven he added a general line of upholstery hardware. Later the firm was consolidated with the Turnet, Turner & Clark Mfg. Co., and the Seymour Mfg. Co. of Torrington and Edward M. Judd became the general manager of the Torrington plants. The firm was known as the Turner, Seymour & Judd Co. In 1870 he sold out his interest in the company and assisted in the formation of the Judd Manufacturing Co., at New Haven. The new company engaged in the manufacture of general hardware as well as upholstery hardware.

Under his management these various companies prospered beyond all expectations and in 1874 Mr. Judd went to Brooklyn and while still retaining his interest in the Judd Manufacturing Co., started the firm of H. L. Judd & Co. After three years he located in Wallingford, where the Judd interests have since been centered.

For thirty years Mr. Judd was actively engaged in the large manufacturing interests of the family and in 1887 he retired to pass the latter half of his life in the rest and enjoyment his early labors would warrant. He was the inventor of a large number of curtain fixtures and his last venture was a stamp-canceling machine, which he considered his best work. This machine, which completely destroys the stamp, has been patented in this country and elsewhere.

During his busy life, Mr. Judd did not find time to attend to civic duties. In politics he was a staunch Republican, and cast his first vote for Abraham Lincoln. While he was never an office seeker he never sought to evade the responsibilities of citizenship. He had served on the board of burgesses and on the school committee, and in 1897 was elected judge of the borough court which office he held at the time of his death.

In every way that he could he had worked for the welfare of his town and state, and gave his aid, financial and moral to the support of any enterprise that would in any way benefit the community.

He was one of the original incorporators of the First National Bank. In his religious faith he was a Congreationalist and a member of the First Church in which he had served as superintendent of the Sunday school, and as chairman of the societies committee. Of generous disposition he gave largely to charity but carried on the custom of his family in that he carried on his good deeds quietly.

On March 27, 1860, occurred the marriage of Edward Morton Judd and Jane A. Peck, daughter of Joel and Charlotte (Scoville) Peck, and to this union came children as follows; William Theodore, born March 1, 1866, died February 24, 1867; Jennie Susan, born March 8, 1872, married on October 1, 1895; Charles G. Phelps, of Wallingford, secretary to the late Orville H. Platt, senator from Connecticut, and clerk to the committee on Cuban affairs; Edward Peck, born August 3, 1877.

Besides her husband, she leaves a two weeks' old daughter, Susanna.

GEORGE M. JUDD, Dies Suddenly Of Heart Attack, Great-grandson of Lucy Ariail Well Known Citizen, Son Of Founder of Judd Manufacturing Co.

Death removed one of the town's well known and highly esteemed citizens yesterday afternoon about 1:30 o'clock, when George Morton Judd, 74, succumbed to a heart attack at his home, 132 Prince Street.

His death will come as a distinct shock to many as he had been about town as usual on Tuesday. On retiring at night he complained of not feeling so well, and yesterday morning a physician was summoned. He gradually grew worse and was stricken shortly after the noon hour by his fatal attack.

Deceased is survived by two daughters, Miss Alice Judd, who is at home, Mrs. Katherine Judd Monty of Altoona, N.Y., one son, Philip Sedgwick Judd, of West Haven, four grandchildren, one brother, Albert L. Judd, and one aunt, Mrs. H. H. Martin, both of South Main Street.

Funeral Saturday

The funeral will take place Saturday afternoon with services at his home. The Rev. Edwin G. Zellars, pastor of the First Congregational church, will officiate. Burial will be in the family plot in In Memoriam cemetery.

Mr. Judd was a member of the First Congregational church and at one time served as its deacon. He had been extremely interested in church activities. He was a popular member of the Wallingford club.

For many years he was connected with the H. L. Judd Company as pattern maker and designer. He retired in September 1928.

Son Of Albert D. Judd

His father was Albert D. Judd, who at one time conducted a manufacturing business in New Haven. In 1870 the firm became the Judd Manufacturing Company, with all the Judds' holding interest in it. They continued to run the factory in New Haven until 1877, when it was removed to Wallingford. Albert D. Judd became president of the company and so continued until 1888, when he sold his interest to H. L. Judd and Company. He still retained a large part of the stock, which on the death of its president, H. L. Judd, in 1899, was sold to his New York partner, with Albert D. Judd, the only stockholder bearing the name of Judd.

Albert D. Judd was also the original incorporator of the Wallingford National bank, and had served as its director. He was one of the appraisers of the Dime Savings bank, and also served for a time as vice president of the First National bank, but was obliged to resign owing to ill health. He was also a member of the First Congregational church of this town.

MRS. ETHEL JUDD, Wife of Albert Lemuel Judd, Dies; Had Long, Historic Background

Mrs. Ethel Gardiner Judd, widow of Albert Lemuel Judd, died at her home yesterday after a long illness.

Born in Chicago, Ill., she had lived in Wallingford in the same house ever since her marriage in 1894.

A direct descendant of Lion Gardiner, who settled the Isle of Wight – now Gardiner's Island – Mrs. Judd was a daughter of Howard Calhoun Gardiner, one of the "fortynines" of a century ago.

An early member of the Village Improvement Society, Mrs. Judd also served on the Library Board. She was a member of the First Congregational Church and held the office for a year as president of the Ladies Benevolent Society.

She leaves a daughter, Lucelia Wells Judd, of Wallingford; a son, Howard Stanley Judd, of Canbury, N.J.; granddaughters, Mrs. Dorman McFaddin, Jr., of Long Branch, N.J. and Mrs. John Van Kirk Silcox, of Princeton, N.J.; grandsons, Howard Stanley Judd, Jr. and Rodney Layton Judd, of Canbury, N.J.; and a sister, Mrs. Adelaide McKercher, of Wallingford.

ALBERT D. JUDD, Passes Away, Grandson of Lucy Ariail Well Known Wallingford Citizen

One of the borough's well-known and most highly esteemed citizens passed away yesterday morning shortly after 7 o'clock when death claimed Albert D. Judd. He was in his seventy-eighth year and death was due to aortic aneurysm. He is survived by a daughter; Miss Katherine W., two sons, George M. and Albert L. Judd and a sister, Mrs. Martha Martin, widow of Harry Martin.

Deceased was a member of the First Congregational church and a deacon there, he was one of the original incorporators of the Wallingford National bank and served at one time as vice president of that institution. The funeral will be held from the house, 92 South Main Street, Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and interment will be in In Memoriam cemetery.

Last evening the following gentlemen were selected as bearers for the funeral of Albert D. Judd: W. H. Goddard, Noah Linsley, A. Dixon, George Dickerman, L. Hall and W. H. Newton.

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"Albert Dunham Judd, second son of Morton Judd, was born December 4, 1830, in New Britain, Conn. He took advantage of such opportunities for an education as were offered him, and after some attendance at the common schools was for sometime a student in the Williston seminary, Easthampton, Mass.

"On leaving the school room, Albert D. Judd went at once to work assisting his brother and uncle, M. and O. C. Judd, on harness hames. He remained with them until the firm sold out to Henry North, when he turned his attention to the manufacture of the sash fasteners invented by his father.

"At the end of four or five years he was admitted into partnership and twelve years later purchased the business, retaining it, however, but a few weeks, when he resold it to his uncle. Oliver S. Judd.

"Idleness was not attractive to him, and in 1864, Albert D. Judd removed to New Haven, purchasing the buildings of Beach Burwell, a contractor and builder, and the firm of M. and A. Judd, manufacturers of upholstery, hardware was launched. Two years later E. M. Judd & Co. consolidated with the Turner & Clark Manufacturing Company and the Seymour Manufacturing Company, both of Torrington. The factory was removed to the western part of the town and the manufacture of builders' hardware was added.

"In 1870, the firm became the Judd Manufacturing Company and all the Judds' held interests in it. They continued to run the factory in New Haven until 1877, when it was removed to Wallingford. He was still a large stockholder in the company, which on the death of its president, H. L. Judd in1899, was sold to his New York partner and at the time of his death he (Albert D.) was the only stockholder bearing the name of Judd.

"He was one of the original incorporators of the Wallingford National bank and had served as a director. He was director in the Dime Savings bank, and one of the appraisers of the Savings bank. He also served a short time as vice president of the First National bank, but was obliged to resign on account of ill health.

"In all the large enterprises of the community Albert D. Judd had left his impress. In nearly all he had taken an active part but it has left him little time for himself.

"In his political affiliations he had been a strong Republican and had served on the board of burgesses and held other offices, giving to the affairs of the people the same care and consideration ever given to his private affairs.

"Mr. Judd was a faithful worker in the religious world. He was a member of the First Congregational church of Wallingford of which he had served as deacon since his residence here. He held the same office in the Center Congregational church in New Britain and while in New Haven he was instrumental in the building of the Dwight Place Congregational church, being one of a committee of three who selected the site, and was also one of the building committee during the construction of the church edifice. Later he became a member of the society committee, and of the church committee and also served the church as deacon.

"On April 25, 1855, Albert D. Judd wedded Miss Lucelia Wells, who was born Oct 27, 1828, a daughter of Horace and Pamelia (Sedgwick) Wells, the former a native of New Britain, and the latter of West Hartford. Mr. Judd died Aug 5, 1890

PIONEER AND WEALTHY CITIZEN PASSES AWAY Died Saturday Morning from An Attack of Acute Indigestion. Among Columbus' Wealthiest Men Funeral Will Occur This Afternoon at 3 o'clock at Residence of Mr. H. L. Woodruff.

Mr. George W. Woodruff, one of the oldest and most prominent citizens of Columbus died at the residence of his son, Mr. Henry L. Woodruff, 1420 Second avenue, Saturday morning at 10:03 o'clock from an attach of acute indigestion, lasting only about three hours.

The death of Mr. Woodruff came as a surprise to all who knew him for he had been in as good health as usual, immediately preceeding his death and was down town Friday looking after his business matters as was his custom and no one had an idea that death was so near.

He arose Saturday morning about the regular time and soon afterwards complained to his son, Mr. H. L. Woodruff that he had a severe pain in his chest. After trying a few simple remedies to give him relief, without success, a physician was summoned and remained at his bedside until the end came at the hour mentioned above, surrounded by some of the members of the family of his son, who had been summoned, when it was seen that his condition was critical.

His daughter, Mrs. Joel Hurt and his son, Mr. Ernest Woodruff, of Atlanta, were notified of the death of their father by long distance telephone and came to Collumbus last night and other relatives are expected to reach the city during today.

Mr. Woodruff, was long a familiar figure in Columbus, having spent the greater part of his life in this city, where he amassed a fortune, which easily placed him among the wealthiest men of Columbus. He was largely interested in Columbus real estate and no one had more faith in the future of the city than he.

He was a man who built his own fortune and made a careful study of every investment that he ever made and did not believe in going into anything until he was conviced that it was a safe proposition. He knew the business end of life and by close attention to his affairs he knew the exact status of his business at all times.

Born In Connecticut

George W. Woodruff was born in Southington, Connecticut, December 21st, 1824, and would therefore have been eighty-seven years of age the 21st, of next December. At the age of eight years, he moved with his parents to Smokey Ordinary, Va., where he received his early education.

In early manhood he moved with his family to Macon, where he clerked in the store of his father for a number of years. In 1842 he moved to Columbus, where he again clerked in the store of his father until 1848, when he formed a parthership with a Mr. Merry. Together they conducted a clothing business for a number of years, being highly successful in this business venture.

Married In 1850.

On April 3, 1850, Mr. Woodruff was united in marriage to Miss Virginia Lindsey, a member of one of Georgia's oldest and most prominent families and to this union six children were born, three of whom are now living. Mrs. Woodruff passed away several months ago. The three surviving children are Mr. H. L. Woodruff, of Columbus and Mors. Joel Hurt and Mr. Ernest Woodruff of Atlanta.

In the year 1853 Mr. Woodruff moved to Juniper, where he formed a co-partnership with the father of Mr. Henry R. Goetchius and together they conducted a sawmill business in a highly successful manner for a number of years, their parthership being severed when Mr. Woodruff moved back to Columbus in the year 1859, when he built the residence now occupied by Mr. George Neill.

Established Empire Mills

After moving back to Columbus Mr. Woodruff launched into business on a broader scale and in the year 1859 as a member of the firm of Browne, Woodruff and Clements, the Empire Mills were established and it was in this business enterprise that most of the financial success of Mr. Woodruff was achieved.

During the civil war, Mr. Woodruff operated the Empire mills for the Confederate government, and he had great faith in its ultimate success. So strong was he in his faith in the final success of the Confederacy that his entire wealth at the close of the war was in the money of the Confederate states, with the exception of ten dollars in gold. During this period he operated in a very successful manner a rope factory, which was a paying inventment during those days.

At the close of the war, seeing that he must in some manner rebuild his lost fortune, he borrowed money with which he purchased a car of wheat and a car of corn and success marked his efforts from this time forward. Remaining in active charge of the Empire mills until 1904, he sold out that plant, when he retired from active business, since which time he has devoted his attention to his investments.

Was A Presbyterian

Mr. Woodruff lived in a modest life. He was the same thing to all men all the time, and while he was a warm friend to those upon whom he bestowed his friendship, he was never one of the kind to make great pretentions of friendship unless he really meant it.

He was a man of strictly temperate habits. He never formed habits that were injurious to his health, and this is one of the reasons of his remaining strong and active even until he had far past his four score years. In early manhood he united with the Presbyterian Church and remained a faithful and true member until the hour of his death, being a member of that church for more than fifty years.

Old Columbus Citizen

Mr. Woodruff was one of the oldest citizens of Columbus, not only from the standpoint of years but from the length of time that he resided here. Moving here first in the year 1842, he spent practically the remainder of his long life in the city and devoted the greater part of that time to its upbuilding.

At the time of his death he was reputed to be one of the wealthiest citizens of Columbus, various estimates being made of his wealth. He was a man who kept his financial affairs to himself and for this reason no estimate of his weath can be accurately

obtained. He owned extensive property interests in Columbus and was interested in a number of important business enterprises in Atlanta. A great deal of the property owned by Mr. Woodruff in Columbus is on Broad Street and is very valuable.

Mr. Woodruff was a man who depended on his own keen business judgement. One of his greatest assets was his faith in the future of Columbus, for he knew that eery cent invested here was a safe inventment and one that would bring fruits.

He had no desire to hold official positions in life, though he was solicited at various times to offer his services to serve in various public capacities. He preferred to devote his time and talent to his own affairs, having no taste whatever for public duties.

Quite Feeble In Summer

During the past summer Mr. Woodruff was quite feeble and spent some time in Atlanta. Members of his family were very solicitous of his health and it was feared that he would not live long. However, he returned to Columbus while in this feeble condition and soon regained his health apparently, and frequently drove down town, having transacted some business as late as Friday afternoon. Owing to the improved condition of his health during the past few weeks no one had any idea that the end was so near.

While he was very old, his death came as a distinct shock to the members of his family and his friends. Yesterday afternoon and last night scores of friends called to extend their sympathy to members of the family and to express their regret at the passing away of this old and honored citizen.

Funeral This Afternoon

The funeral of Mr. Woodruff will occur this afternoon at 3 o'clock at the residence of his son, Mr. Henry L. Woodruff, 1420 Second Avenue, and the services will be conducted by Dr. I. S. McElory, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, who will be assisted by Dr. W. A. Carter, a longtime friend of the deceased.

Hundreds of friends will gather to pay a last tribute of respect to the memory of the man whose faith was so great in the city, where he spent the greater part of his life. His remains will be laid to rest in Linnwood cemetery beside those of his wife.

G. W. Woodruff Dies Suddenly, Another Version of Obit for Diadamia Dunham's stepson

One of The Most Prominent Citizens of Columbus has Passed Away
He Had Reached A Ripe Old Age
Owner of the Empire Mills and a Most Successful Pusings

Former Owner of the Empire Mills and a Most Successful Business Man Funeral Will Take Place This Afternoon

Col George W. Woodruff, one of the oldest and most prominent citizens of Columbus, died rather suddenly at the home of his son, Mr. Henry L. Woodruff, No. 1420 Second Avenue, Saturday morning at 10:03 o'clock. He was taken ill with acute indigestion at

7:16 a.m. and although he received prompt attention, he gradually grew worse until death relieved him of his sufferings.

Mr. Woodruff has resided in Columbus for many years and had been a much successful businessman, having accumulated a handsome fortune. He was born December 21, 1824, at Southington, Conn., and his father moved to Virginia when the deceased was eight years of age and he received his education in the common schools of the state. Subquently the family moved to Macon, but came to Columbus in 1842 and engaged in the dry goods business in which Mr. Woodruff was employed. In 1848, Mr. George W. Woodruff went into the clothing business as a member of the firm of Merry & Woodruff. In 1853 he formed a copartnership with the father of Henry R. Goetchius, Esq., and conducted a sawmill and planning business. Mr. Woodruff moved to Juniper and operated the sawmill, while Mr. Goetchius conducted the planning mill business in this city, in which they were very successful.

Mr. Woodruff was married to Miss Verginia Lindsay on April 3, 1850, and to this union six children were born, three of whom survive him. They are Mr. Henry L. Woodruff, of Columbus, and Mrs. Ernest Woodruff and Mrs. Joel Hurt, of Atlanta. His wife died only a few months ago. There are also a number of grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

In 1859, Mr. Woodruff removed to this city from Juniper and formed the co-partnership of Browne, Woodruff & Clements and organized the Empire Mills Company. They operated the mill for the Confederate government during the war and also ran a rope factory with profit. He had such faith in the success of the Confederacy that he hid away his savings and when the war ended he was practically without means, having only \$10 in gold. Mr. Riley Browne agreed to repair the mill for him on credit and he borrowed money from friends and purchased a carload of corn and wheat each and resumed operations. He continued at the head of the mills until 1904, when he retired from business on account of his age. His success in the milling business was remarkable, as it is well known that he accumulated a handsome fortune before his retirement. Of course, he was interested in other business projects, but his greatest success was at the head of the Empire Mills.

Few men were more attentive to business than Mr. Woodruff, yet he was always courteous and considerate. He was a man of very temperate habits. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and a regular attendant at its services. In his death the city loses one of its most prominent citizens and the sympathy of a large circle of friends is extended the bereaved family. In his home life he was always kind and considerate and was ever ready to make sacrifices for his loved ones.

The funeral will take place from the residence of Mr. H. L. Woodruff this afternoon at 3 o'clock and will be conducted by Rev. Dr. McElroy, assisted by Rev. Dr. Carter. The interment will be in Linwood Cemetery and his grandchildren will act as pallbearers. The following gentlemen are requested to act as honorary escort: G. Gunby Jordan, J. J. slade, H. R. GEORGE CECIL WOODRUFF, Diadamia Dunham's step-descendents

George Cecil Woodruff Sr., former head football coach at the University of Georgia, a member of its Board of Regents for 12 years and a leading Columbus businessman, died late Saturday at his residence, 1811 Buena Vista Road. He was 79.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

Mr. Woodruff was a lifetime resident of Columbus and played a leading part in its business and civic development.

He was chairman of the board of Woodruff-Brown Co., Home Federal Savings and Loan Association, and Georgia Company.

Mr. Woodruff was educated in Columbus public schools, the University School for Boys at Stone Mountain, Ga., and the University of Georgia. At the latter, he had a brilliant four years in football beginning 1907.

He later served as head coach at the University from 1923 to 1927. He resigned to devote fulltime to his extensive business interests here.

He served three terms on the University's Board of Regents, from 1932-43 under appointment by Gov. Dick Russell and 1943-49 under appointment by Gov. Ellis Arnall.

He was founder and chairman of the Georgia Student Education Fund.

During World War I, he served with the 82nd Infantry Division.

Mr. Woodruff was a member of the Rotary Club of Columbus, First Presbyterian Church, the Columbus Country Club, Big Eddy Club, Thronakeesta Club and was former commander of Charles S. Harrison Post of the American Legion.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Kathleen Koonce Woodruff and a son, George C. Woodruff Jr.

Woodruff Dies Of Pneumonia Prominent Columbus Citizen, Victim of Recent Auto Accident at Athens Funeral From Home Wynnton Thursday One of Georgia's Greatest Football Players Popular and Prominent in Business Circles Here

Harry Woodruff, prominent insurance man of Columbus, Ga., and one of Georgia University's greatest football players, died this morning following an automobile accident last Friday night.

Mr. Woodruff, in company with his brother, Jim Woodruff, Alfred Young and Jeff Kelly, all of Columbus, were driving to Athens "home-coming" football game and when about 12 miles from this city the car turned over rounding a sharp curve and Mr. Woodruff who was driving, sustained a broken spine. The other occupants were not seriously injured. The victims were rushed to a local hospital but the former football star never showed any improvement until the end came.

Original "Kid" Woodruff

Harry Woodruff was known as the original "Kid" Woodruff, of Georgia football fame, having played on the Georgia teams from 1902 to 1905, making a run against Auburn for 103 yards in Atlanta that made him famous. He was 41 years old and in 1912 married Miss Frances Henley, of Athens, who survives him. He is also survived by two brothers, Jim and George Woodruff, the latter being head coach of football at the university, one sister, Mrs. Clifford Swift, of Columbus, his mother, Mrs. Henry L. Woodruff, of Columbus and a number of other more distant relatives, including several in Atlanta. He was a member of the Kappa Alpha fraternity and the Presbyterian Church. His body will be shipped to Columbus Wednesday afternoon, reaching there about eight o'clock Wednesday night. Funeral arrangements will be made there.

Funeral Thursday

News of the death of Mr. Woodruff, caused by pneumonia developing Tuesday reached the city early today, and it was received with a shock by his many friends, despite the fact that they were prepared for the worst, his very low condition, and complete paralysis since his fatal accident, having convinced all that he couldn't live, although he put up a brave fight to the last. He was conscious most of the time.

At his bedside when the end came were his wife, Mr. And Mrs. J. W. Woodruff, George Woodruff and others from Columbus. His mother had returned to the city the day before. The remains will reach Columbus over the Central tonight at 8:55 o'clock and the funeral will be held from the residence of the deceased on Chatham drive, Wynnton, some time Thursday, the exact hour to be announced later. Rev. Dr. R. M. Stimson will conduct the services, and interment will be in Linwood.

Prominent and Popular

Mr. Woodruff was one of the best-known and most popular young businessmen of Columbus. He was a member of the firm of Woodruff and company, insurance agentshis brothers being with him in the business. He was a director of the Columbus Savings Bank and Trust Co., and also an extensive farmer.

In social and business circles the deceased was exceedingly popular. He was a member of the Muscogee club, the Country Club and a number of college fraternities, being especially popular in athletic circles of the University of Georgia, from which institution he graduated with honors.

During his lingering his popularity was demonstrated by constant calls at homes of relatives, numerous anxious inquires being made by friends in all the walks of life, and news of his death will be noted with extreme regret, not only in Columbus, but in Athens and throughout the state.

A businessman, civic leader, and scion of one of Columbus' first families, J. W. Woodruff Jr. was considered by most to be a man of all eras.

As president of Columbus Broadcasting Co., he was a man of today; in his work with the Historic Columbus Foundation and the National Infantry Museum, he was a preserver of history; and in his concern with southeastern waterways, he was a planner for the future.

The 62-year-old Woodruff died at 8:45 Sunday night in an Athens hospital from injuries received in an auto accident Oct. 2.

John Gause, the driver of the Woodruff car at the time of the accident, remained in satisfactory condition Monday in St. Mary's Hospital in Athens, with leg, rib and head injuries. Gause is the deputy public affairs officer at Ft. Benning.

Woodruff was born Sep 29, 1914, in Columbus, son of Mr. And Mrs. J. W. Woodruff Sr.

Woodruff joined his father in running WRBL radio in 1935 after graduating from the University of Georgia. After 14 months with the U.S. Army Signal Corps during World War II, he came back to Columbus to begin a long career of public service.

As was the senior Woodruff, Woodruff Jr. had a long-time interest in development of the Chattahoochee and other waterways in Georgia.

In 1958, President Dwight Eisenhower appointed him chairman of an 11-member commission to study development of river basins in Georgia, South Carolina, Florida and Alabama.

Woodruff was on the Columbus Industrial and Port Development and was named Georgia director-at-large for Tri-Rivers Waterways in 1973.

Woodruff was elected in March to his third term as national president of the Association of the U. S. Army. His interest and support for the military helped earn for him in 1972 the highest military award given to a civilian – Distinguished Civilian Service.

He led the drive for a national Infantry Museum at Ft. Benning, home of the Infantry. In 1968 he was named president of the Infantry Museum Association. He was selected civilian aide to Secretary of the Army, Howard "Bo" Callaway of Pine Mountain, in 1973.

His abilities were recognized on a state level. He headed the Georgia Chamber of Commerce and was appointed in 1963 to a committee studying simplification of Georgia's constitution. For his interest in hiring of the handicapped, he was named Employer of the Year for 1976 by the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped.

In 1974 he was cited by the U.S. Department of Commerce for his energy-saving measure in the Goetchius House, Ralston Corp. and Columbus Broadcasting Co., all companies he headed.

A moving force in the restoration of Columbus landmarks, Woodruff was chairman of the board of Historic Columbus Foundation and president of the 1828 corp.

Woodruff business interests included WRBL radio and television, the Columbus Broadcasting Co., Goetchius House, the Ralston Corp. and since 1973, chairman of the board of First National Bank.

George Gingell, public affairs director for the Columbus Broadcasting Co., said Monday Woodruff was "very close to all his employees."

"It was not an employer-type relationship. He had a personal interest in all of us. He was very dedicated to his company. Although he was very busy with other affairs, his heart was with the company," Gingell said.

M. R. Ashworth, president emeritus of The Ledger-Enquirer who had served with Woodruff in the AUSA and was a close personal friend, noted that Woodruff led many fields besides communications, including the military and water development.

"He was an eloquent speaker with a brilliant mind with a sense of fairness and a profound depth of patriotism. He shard these attributes lavishly. He gave generously of his time to his wide interests and of his personal wealth.

The recipient of numerous civic awards, he was named Columbus Citizen of the Year in 1976 by the Life Underwriters' Association and was given the prestigious Pioneer Broadcasting Award in 1975 by the University of Georgia.

W. Woodruff Sr., Columbus; a brother, J. Barnett Woodruff, Columbus; sisters, Mrs. Philip H. Draper, Columbus and Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., Miss Emily Woodruff, Columbus; and five grandchildren.

Leaders Mourn Death of James Woodruff

Military, business and civic leaders mourned the loss of James Woodruff Jr. today and some expressed concern about the void in local military-civilian relations left by Woodruff's death.

Woodruff, 62, died Sunday night in an Athens hospital from injuries suffered in an auto accident Oct. 2.

Brown Nicholson, president of the local chapter of the Association of the United States Army (AUSA), of which Woodruff was national president, said the civic leader's death "leaves a gaping hole in our organization."

"We'll march on, I guess, but with a great deal of difficulty," he said. Nicholson said he first met Woodruff just after World War II, when Woodruff was working as a radio announcer under the pseudonym "James Wood" for the family-owned WRBL.

Nicholson and former Ft. Benning Commanding General Thomas Tarpley, now an executive with the First National Bank, expressed concern about future economic relations between the Columbus-Phenix City business community and Ft. Benning – an area in which Woodruff was deeply involved.

"Those economic relations are a very vital part of the community that cannot be left untended," Nicholson said. "A lot of different people are going to be needed to step in and do the things Jim was doing."

Tarpley said Woodruff's death "is a loss to the wonderful rapport he established in military-civilian relations through his work in civic affairs and his support for a strong national defense."

"Nobody may be indispensable, but he came as close as anyone I've known in my lifetime," Tarpley said.

The former commanding general said he first met Woodruff in 1973 when Tarpley arrived at Ft. Benning. Before long, Tarpley said, Woodruff was his "most valued counselor on civilian and military affairs."

Former Secretary of the Army Howard "Bo" Callaway said news of Woodruff's death brought him "great personal sadness."

Callaway appointed Woodruff Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army in 1973.

"Whenever I needed him, he was available," Callaway said of his former aide. "There just aren't many Jim Woodruffs' around."

In a statement released Monday morning, Ft. Benning Commanding Gen. Willard Latham said "the Army has lost a great friend and champion in the untimely and tragic death" of Woodruff.

Latham called Woodruff "a rare man."

"He was devoted and untiring in his support of his community. Through his leadership we are on the threshold of having a national museum devoted to the infantry, a branch of service which was dear to his heart," Latham said.

The dedication of the Ft. Benning, U. S. Army Infantry Museum, and the 30th anniversary ceremonies of the local Civilian and Military Council, were scheduled for last Saturday, but were postponed after Woodruff's accident.

Woodruff was president of the National Infantry Museum Association and a member of the Civilian and Military Council.

M. R. Ashworth, president emeritus of The Ledger-Enquirer, who has served with Woodruff in the AUSA and was a close personal friend, noted that Woodruff led many fields besides communications, including the military and water development fields.

'MR. RIVER' – Woodruff Sr. Dead at 83 Pioneer in Development of River

James Waldo Woodruff, a pioneer of river development in the Chattahoochee Valley and a leading businessman and financier in Columbus for more than half a century, is dead at 83.

Mr. Woodruff, who was known as "Mr. River" for most of his life, died at 6:25 p.m. yesterday at his home, 1817 Stark Ave., after a short illness.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p.m. tomorrow at the graveside at Parkhill Cemetery with Dr. Sidney Austin Gates, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, officiating.

Active pallbearers will be Kenneth White, W. J. Long, Harry Robertson, George Gingell, Maynard Ashworth, Thomas W. Tillman, Albert Stubbs, Joe Gamble, M. J. Lane and J. D. Pope.

An engineer, and an intrepid visionary, Mr. Woodruff was probably the staunchest pioneer of the development of the Chattahoochee River for power and navigation. He devoted a great deal of his busy life to this favorite dream and he lived long enough to see dock construction here begin and his dream well on its way to coming true.

Business Interests

His business interests extended far and wide. To the thousands of employees and executives in those businesses he was known as "Mr. Jim", a slight, spade-bearded gentleman, possessed of dynamic energy and an enthusiasm for business and engineering challenges that amazed much younger associates.

He directed the manufacture of textile dyeing machinery, dairy and truck farming, real estate holdings and realty businesses, home construction, logging and timber processing and radio and television broadcasting.

His interests in each of these fields were substantial enough to keep him in the front ranks of Georgia business and financial leaders, a place he filled almost as soon as he graduated from the Alabama Polytechnic Institute, now Auburn University, in 1900, with a degree in mechanical and electrical engineering.

He began his business and engineering career with the Atlantic Steel Co. and the Atlantic Consolidated Railway. Later, he was appointed secretary and treasurer of the Columbus Ice Company, the firm founded by his father, Henry Lindsay Woodruff, in 1906. After the creation of the Atlantic Ice and Coal Co. here, he was appointed assistant to the president and was in charge of the operation of the firm's 56 plants throughout the South.

As Young Engineer

His long association with river development here began as a young engineer. Even then he was talking about the mighty potentialities of the Chattahoochee River, and its promise of prosperity and power, which could be realized through a system of dams and navigable channels from the Gulf of Mexico.

What might at first have seemed a hobby became a mission with Mr. Woodruff and soon he was known as "Mr. River" and "Mr. Chattahoochee". He began by rellying forces throughout the Valley and he took an outline of his dream to Washington to gain the support of legislators and U. S. Rivers and Harbors officials.

In the spring of 1935, he formed the Three Rivers Development Association composed of prominent citizens of the lower Chattahoochee Valley, to spearhead his (bid) for a system of dams and locks along the Chattahoochee, the Flint and Apalachicola Rivers.

When then Gov. Herman Talmadge created the Georgia Waterways Commission in 1963, Mr. Woodruff was appointed chairman and he worked for the development of all the waterways in Georgia, contributing much time, effort and money.

It was only fitting, therefore, that the first dam to be constructed in the three-rivers development plan should bear his name. The Jim Woodruff Lock and Dam was dedicated on Mar. 22, 1957. It was built at a cost of \$46,380,000 and stands where the Flint and Chattahoochee rivers united to form the Apalachicola.

Frail, but as alert as ever, Mr. Woodruff made his last visit to the river in the summer of 1961 when, with son James W. Woodruff Jr., he posed for a Ledger-Anniversary color cover picture at the mighty Walter F. George Lock and Dam, then nearing completion.

Then, in 1962, he stood alongside Gov. Ernest Vandiver, in the Municipal auditorium here, to turn over a spade full of dirt brought from a spot on the rivers bank which was that day dedicated as the site for the Columbus dock.

His commendations have been many and his unselfish devotion to river development in Georgia and the adjacent states won him recognition from governors and presidents.

On 80th Birthday

On the occasion of his 80th birthday in 1959, Mr. Woodruff received expressions of congratulation and praise for his service through the years. Messages were received from President Dwight Eisenhower, Sen. Herman Talmadge, Sen. Richard B. Russell, third District U.S. E. L. Forrester and Atlanta Mayor William B. Hartsfield. A resolution of commendation passed by the Georgia Senate was read to his surprise birthday party at the Capital City Club in Atlanta.

In 1961, the Atlanta City Council commended Mr. Woodruff for his efforts to make the Chattahoochee navigable.

The Atlanta Constitution's editorial at the time stated:

"Mr. Woodruff had the foresight to see the importance of developing the Chattahoochee when few did. He has worked consistently toward that end and while the ultimate goal has not been achieved, a large amount of progress has been made. There will be additional strides in the years ahead, thanks to the efforts of men like 'Mr. Chattahoochee'"

Civic Field

In the field of civic and philanthropic service, Mr. Woodruff organized the Chattahoochee Valley Chamber of Commerce in 1935, an organization to promote and interest these counties in river development. He served on boards of the City Hospital, now The Medical Center, and played a key role in the creation of the Warm Springs Foundation, making a contribution of property to this foundation.

When St. Francis Hospital was opened early in 1960, the ground for the hospital was given by Mr. Woodruff. Mr. Woodruff was a member of the hospital board at the time of his death.

Mr. Woodruff was at one time a city alderman in Columbus. He voted himself out of office when he originated the bill to have a city manager form of government under which Columbus has operated for the past generation.

Married in 1908

Mr. Woodruff married the former Miss Ethel Illges Oct 7, 1908, the wedding being held at the Illges family home on Second Avenue. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church.

A former member of the board of directors of the First National Bank, Mr. Woodruff also was an honorary member of the Rotary Club. He was a 32-degree Mason and was a member of the Mount Herman Lodge, Darley Chapter, a Shriner and Knights Templar. He was the oldest exalted ruler of the Columbus Elks Club.

Survivors besides his wife include two daughters, Mrs. Philip H. Draper, Colorado Springs, Colo.; Miss Emily Woodruff, Hollywood, Calif.; two sons, James W. Woodruff Jr., and J. Barnett Woodruff; a sister. Mrs. Clifford J. Swift, Sr.; and a brother George C. Woodruff Sr., all of Columbus.

Other survivors include 13 grandchildren. Mr. Robert W. Newton, Mrs. Williams S. deCamp, Cadet Stephen E. Draper, Shelia Draper, Deborah Woodruff, James W. Woodruff III, Chevir Woodruff, Victoria Woodruff, Dena Woodruff, Stephen Woodruff, Barnett Woodruff Jr., Katherine Woodruff and Chester Woodruff; four great grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Leaders Lament Woodruff's Death

State, City and County officials and members of Georgia's legislative delegation in Washington today mourned the passing of James W. Woodruff Sr., the "Father of the Chattahoochee."

Gov. Carl Sanders said last night Mr. Woodruff's passing "will be felt not only by the Columbus area but by the whole of Georgia."

In Washington, Rep. E. L. (Tic) Forrester said Mr. Woodruff was a man of "tremendous ability, unbounded energy and determined will."

And Georgia Ports Authority Chairman Robert C. Norman said in Augusta, "All of Georgia feels the loss of this great man."

Gov. Sanders said, "Mr. Woodruff was a dedicated servant of the people, and my friend."

"Many will mourn his passing. His works, however, will long be remembered and will be a tribute to the great contributions he made in a full and worthy life."

In Washington, Forrester told the Associated Press that Mr. Woodruff was a man "of Tremendous ability unbounded energy and determined will."

"He was successful in all of his undertakings and was highly respected for his business achievements, his civic improvements and we affectionately called him 'Mr.

Chattahoochee,' for he dreamed the dream and pushed to completion the development of the famous Chattahoochee River, thereby furnishing an outlet from Columbus to the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean.

"He laid down his working tools just as his great work was brought to successful conclusion," Forrester said.

"Georgians know the great contributions that Mr. Woodruff made to the progress of our state. Without him, the progress we have made in the development of the Chattahoochee River, as well as the other important waterway improvements would not have been possible," said Ports Chairman Norman.

In Columbus, Mayor Steve Knight said the accomplishments of Mr. Woodruff are a "living tribute to his good deeds."

Knight said, "We are extremely sad to hear of the loss of such an outstanding citizen." Malcholm Forte, vice chairman of Muscogee County Commission, said the passing of Mr. Woodruff was a "distinct loss to the community."

"He was behind many things that helped build our city to what it is today. What he did helped mold our future and the outlook we have today," Forte added.

Died Sunday

Mr. Woodruff died Sunday at his residence, 1817 Stark Ave., after a short illness. Often referred to as "Mr. Chattahoochee," Mr. Woodruff was the one person, more than any other, responsible for the development of the Chattahoochee River for power and navigation.

His contributions to his state and nation were noted in the following message from Sen. Richard B. Russell in Washington:

"In the passing of Jim Woodruff Sr., the state has lost an outstanding citizen and I mourn the passing of a personal friend."

Dam Named For Him

"Mr. Woodruff was a pioneer in the development of the rivers and water resources of Georgia and his efforts continued over many decades. As a memorial to his vision and efforts, the first of the large dams on the Chattahoochee – Apalachicola Rivers was named in his honor.

"His contributions to the progress and development of our state and nation were many, and I know it was a source of great pride to him to see his son, Jim Woodruff Jr., carry on so effectively the work that he had initiated."

Maj. Gen. James Lambert, an official in the office of the Chief of Engineers, U.S. Army, Washington, arrived in town today to attend Mr. Woodruff's funeral. He will represent the Chief of U. S. Engineers, Lt. Gen. W. K. Wilson Jr., who was Mobile District engineer when construction was started on the Jim Woodruff Lock and Dam at Chattahoochee, Fla., in 1947.

H. L. WOODRUFF'S FUNERAL TODAY

Pneumonia Fatal to Pioneer Citizen and Leading Columbus Business Man
Was Prominent in Civic Affairs Here
President of Empire Mills for Thirty-Three Years and
Founded Big Ice Concern.
Had Retired From Business

Henry L. Woodruff, prominent and widely known citizen and retired businessman, died Saturday morning at 2:30 o'clock of pneumonia. He underwent an operation at the city hospital for appendicitis on Wednesday and pneumonia later developed, proving fatal at the time named.

Mr. Woodruff, who was in his seventieth year, had lived in Columbus practically all his life and took on active interest in business and civic matters. He founded the Columbus

Ice and Cold Storage Company, of which he was for some time president, and which later was absorbed by the Atlantic Ice and Coal Company. He was a stockholder in the latter concern and many other big corporations.

Prominent Mill Man

Mr. Woodruff was for about thirty-three years, president and general manager of the Empire Mills, retiring from his official connection with that company in 1903. He succeeded his father, the late Colonel G. W. Woodruff, as head of the Empire Mills a few years after the close of the War Between the States.

In addition to his business interests, Mr. Woodruff was an active church and civic worker. For a number of years he was chairman of the police commission of Columbus and was very efficient as head of that board, being a conscientious and faithful official. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and formerly a member of the Masons, the Elks and Odd Fellows. Mr. Woodruff owned a large farm in Alabama as well as other farming interests, and since his retirement from active business duties a few years ago, he devoted considerable time to the interests of his farms when his health permitted.

Born at Juniper

Mr. Woodruff was born in Juniper, Ga., on May 20, 1851, and moved to Columbus with his parents when a small child. In October 1875, he was married to Miss Mary Kyle of Talbotton. He was widely known throughout this section of the state, being a member of one of the most prominent families in Georgia.

Surviving are his widow and three sons, James W., Harry E. and George C. Woodruff; one daughter, Mrs. Clifford J. Swift, of Columbus; a brother, Ernest Woodruff, and a sister, Mrs. Joel Hurt, of Atlanta, and seven grandchildren, all of whom have the sympathy of their many friends.

Mrs. Woodruff's condition was not regarded as critical until Friday after pneumonia rapidly developed and death came early Saturday, as stated.

The funeral will take place this afternoon at 3 o'clock from the residence, No. 1430 Second Avenue. Rev. Dr. W. A. Carter will officiate and the interment will be in Linwood cemetery. Henry L. Woodruff

In the death of Mr. Henry L. Woodruff Columbus loses one of its best known, most highly esteemed, and generally beloved citizens.

Mr. Woodruff, who was one of the most successful manufacturers of the district, figured quite prominently in civic and community affairs, holding the office of police commissioner for years with honor and credit, serving as chairman of the body for some time. While he had retired from the business world, so to speak, he was still quite active

as a citizen up to the time of his death, and having been ill such a short period, news of his passing came as a great shock to his many friends.

The deceased loved Columbus and he was always ready and willing to contribute, both financially and otherwise, to the city's progress and advancement. Mr. Woodruff belonged to one of the oldest and most prominent families in the State, his father, the late George W. Woodruff, being a pioneer citizen who had much to do with the settlement and early development of Columbus prior to, and following the Civil War.

Columbus can ill-afford this loss and Columbus people generally are lamenting the passing of Mr. Woodruff today.

Breathed her last at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Joel Hurt, in Atlanta, Monday Evening Coming to the end of life devoted to charity and loving aid to the needy and helpless, Mrs. Virginia Woodruff, one of the best-loved "old-fashioned" women in Georgia, died last night at 7:30 o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Joel Hurt, 85 Elizabeth street, Atlanta, after patient suffering lasting several years. She was 82 years of age.

The south has lost one of its finest women, one whose life was entirely devoted to good works, who was one of the most loyal and ardent workers for the confederacy during the civil war, nursing the soldiers, giving from her bountiful store all, and more, than she could spare, and working with hands that had never before known the roughness of labor.

Mrs. Woodruff was a faithful and devoted member of the First Presbyterian church, of this city, and the news of her death will be a source of genuine sorrow among her coworkers in the cause of her Master. Wallingford, Conn., Dec. 11 – Hubert L. Judd, the wealthiest resident of Wallingford, died this afternoon after a long illness. He was born in New Britain seventy years ago, and first engaged in business there. Later he became the head of the brass manufacturing concern, H. L. Judd & Co., then of Brooklyn, N. Y., and later of this place. He leaves two children, a son and a daughter.

Hubert L. Judd was a nephew of Oliver S. Judd of this city, his father, Morton Judd, who was 91 years of age last November, is well known in this city, where he frequently visits. A Herald reporter carried to O. S. Judd this afternoon the first news of his nephew's death. The deceased was educated in the New Britain schools and early in life rented the rear portion of O. S. Judd's shop on West Main Street and began the manufacture of curtain stick tips. He removed to Torrington, where he became a member of the firm of Turner, Seymour & Judd. His next move was to New York, where he went into business for himself. This concern prospered, but the change of the plant to Wallingford proved a wise one. In addition to the Wallingford plant Mr. Judd owns a large concern at Chattanooga, Tenn. He is said to be worth a million. His wife died twelve years ago.

The body of Hubert L. Judd arrived in this city from Wallingford at 1 o'clock this afternoon, a special car being attached to the regular train for the purpose of conveying the casket, the mourners and the beautiful and costly flowers and floral pieces. Services were held at Mr. Judd's late residence on South Main Street in Wallingford at 10:45 o'clock, the Rev. J. J. Blair officiating. Albert D. Judd Passes Away

Well Known Wallingford Citizen

One of the Borough's well known and most highly esteemed citizens passed away yesterday morning shortly after 7 o'clock when death claimed Albert D. Judd. He was in his seventy-eighth year and death was due to aortic aneurysm. He is survived by a daughter, Miss Katherine W., two sons, George M. and Albert L. Judd and a sister, Mrs. Martha Martin, Widow of Harry Martin.

Deceased was a member of the First Congregational church and a deacon there, he was one of the original incorporators of the Wallingford National bank and served at one time as vice president of that institution. The funeral will be held from the house, 92 South Main Street, Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and interment will be at In Memoriam cemetery.

Last evening the following gentlemen were selected as bearers for the funeral of Albert D. Judd; W. H. Goddard, Noah Linsley, A. Dixon, George Dickerman, L. Hall and W. H. Newton.

It has been decided to have no singing at the funeral.

"Albert Dunham Judd, second son of Morton Judd, was born December 4, 1830, in New Britain, Conn. He took advantage of such opportunities for an education as were offered him, and after some attendance at the common schools was for some time a student in the Williston seminary, Easthampton, Mass.

"On leaving the school room Albert D. Judd went at once to work assisting his brother and uncle, M. and O. C. Judd, on harness hames. He remained with them until the firm sold out to Henry North, when he turned his attention to the manufacture of the sash fasteners invented by his father.

"At the end of four or five years he was admitted into partnership and twelve years later purchased the business, retaining it, however, but a few weeks, when he resold it to his uncle, Oliver S. Judd.

"Idleness was not attractive to him, and in 1864, Albert D. Judd removed to New Haven, purchasing the buildings of Beach Burwell, a contractor and builder, and the firm of M. and A. Judd, manufacturers of upholstery, hardware was launched. Two years later E. M. Judd & Co., consolidated with the Turner & Clark Manufacturing company and the Seymour Manufacturing company, both of Torrington. The factory was removed to the western part of the town and the manufacture of builders' hardware as added.

"In 1870, the firm became the Judd Manufacturing Company; and all the Judd's held interests in it. They continued to run the factory in New Haven until 1877, when it was removed to Wallingford. He was still a large stockholder in the company, which on the death of its president, H. L. Judd in 1899, was sold to his New York partner and at the time of his death, he (Albert D.) was the only stockholder bearing the name of Judd.

"He was one of the original incorporators of the Wallingford National bank and had served as a director. He was director in the Dime Savings bank, and one of the appraisers of the Savings bank. He also served a short time as vice president of the First National bank, but was obliged to resign on account of ill health.

"In all the large enterprises of the community Albert D. Judd had left his impress. In nearly all he had taken an active part but it has left him little time for himself.

"In his political affiliations he had been a strong Republican and had served on the board of burgesses and held other offices, giving to the affairs of the people the same care and consideration ever given to his private affairs.

"Mr. Judd was a faithful worker in the religious world. He was a member of the First Congregational church of Wallingford of which he had served as deacon since his residence here. He held the same office in the Center Congregational church in New Britain and while in New Haven he was instrumental in the building of the Dwight Place Congregational church, being one of a committee of three who selected the site, and was also one of the building committee during the construction of the church edifice. Later he became a member of the society committee, and of the church committee and also served the church as deacon.

"On April 25, 1855, Albert D. Judd wedded Miss Lucilla Wells, who was born October 27, 1828, a daughter of Horace and Pameila (Sedgwick) Wells, the former a native of New Britain, and the latter of West Hartford. Mrs. Judd died August 5, 1900.

We thank God for his services and commend those who are in distress by his departure to the divine comfort and comparison.

The directors of the Savings bank appointed President Charles B. Yale and Charles D. Morris a committee on resolutions and it was voted to attend the funeral in a body. Mr. Judd was first vice president of the bank and one of the directors.

There will be a meeting of the directors of the First National bank today at 12 o'clock for the purpose of taking action on the death of Mr. Judd, who was at one time vice president of the bank.

Toccoa Man Fatally Beaten; Murder Charged to H. Hart. "Red" Duncan Left in Unconscious Condition After Furious Fist Fight

Melvin Eugene (Red) Duncan, 32, a Toccoa construction worker, was fatally beaten at the home of Buddy Bowden on Oak Street about 5:30 Tuesday afternoon. His assailant, Hubert Hart, 40, a Stephens County farmer, has been lodged in the county jail on charges of murder.

According to Sheriff H. T. Mozeley, both men were drinking and the fight was started after an argument between the two, concerning Hart's wife. Witnesses report that no weapon other than his fists was used by Hart in the beating.

After the fight, Duncan was left unconscious on the floor until approximately 7 o'clock when an ambulance was called. During this time he was bleeding badly from cuts and bruises of the head. He died of a brain concussion at 10 p.m. at Stephens County

Hospital. Doctors report that his life may have been saved had he received immediate attention.

Apparently Hart did not realize the seriousness of the incident as he left the scene to tend his nightly duties at his farm. He was arrested there later Tuesday night by Sheriff Mozeley on charge of assault with intent to murder. After Duncan's death the charge was changed to that of murder.

The fight was witnessed by Mr. And Mrs. Buddy Bowden, and Mrs. Mary Winters, Duncan's former wife, Sheriff Mozeley said.

Hart has been involved in several fights recently, none of which, however, were of the seriousness of the present case. He showed intense surprise when told Wednesday morning that Duncan had died. "Your're fooling me," he said to Sheriff Mozeley and refused to believe it when assured it was true. Hart is claiming self defense.

Elizabeth Ann Seymour, daughter of George and Elizabeth Dunham Seymour, was born in Stockbridge, Mass., April 7, 1828; was christened by Parson Field, the father of Cyrus W. and Henry M. Field and was a playmate to their sister, Mary Field.

She came to Annapolis with her father and four young brothers in 1849 and has lived here over 59 years, and was the only person who has lived in the town continuously for so great a number of years.

She was married to Wm. Wilshire Coffin in 1853. Five children were born to them. The two oldest daughters died young, her husband in '79, leaving the two sons, Frank Seymour and John Morton, and one daughter, Mrs. Emma Martin, not mourning, but "waiting till the shadows are a little longer grown," and five grandchildren who loved their grandmother so devotedly and do not yet realize their loss; also one brother, Sydney Albert Seymour, who resides at San Jose, Cal.

Mrs. Coffin was especially fond of all children and all loved to bring her flowers and receive in return her kind words. She will be greatly missed, not only by her own family, but by all the community for, veritably, "she lived in a house by the side of the road and was a friend to man."

Mrs. Coffin was appointed librarian of the famous McClure institute at Annapolis in 1857, and held the position for ten years which gave her the opportunity to become familiar with the best authors and, until failing eyesight prevented, was a great reader and enjoyed her favorite pastime painting and sketching and gathering curious and relics of other days and other climes of which she leaves a large and interesting collection, over which she has spent many happy hours showing them to her friends.

On June 10, at 12:15, she past from this life to a blessed reunion with loved ones gone before.

CLAYTON HOBSON DUNHAM, Great-great-grandson of Lucy Ariail REVOLVER BATTLE ENDS IN 2 DEATHS

Alfred Moes of Lakeville Kills One and Wounds Three Others in Clash

CLAYTON DUNHAM MURDERED IN COLD BLOOD

Murdered by I.W.W. While He Slept—Bandits Apprehended

What is said to have been one of the fiercest one-sided revolver battles ever fought in McLeod county took place in a gondola car on westbound 263 freight about four miles west of Glencoe shortly after nine o'clock Friday evening between Alfred Moes of Lakeville and four I.W.W. bandits.

Young Moes, who is not more than twenty-one years of age, with his unflinching nerve and unerring aim, single-handed held four bandits at bay, killed the leader and seriously wounding the other three.

Clayton Dunham, who was lying but a few feet away from Moes, was killed by one of the bandits while he slept.

The story of the trip, the battle and the apprehension of the bandits as related by Alfred Moes to a Tribune reporter is as follows:

Last Friday he and Clayton Dunham having completed arrangements for a duck hunt they expressed

Their guns and extra clothing to Peever, S.D., the home of Harry Dunham, a brother of the latter where they expected to go and spend a week or so during the open season hunting ducks, they came to Farmington and caught 263, a through freight which does not stop at Lakeville. Both had plenty of money to pay their fare in a first-class car several times, but they were out for the pleasure of being out of doors and as they expected to camp out and sleep in the open they chose a freight car instead.

They hunted through the train and found an open gondola, a car loaded with crated machinery billed for Japan; this suiting their purpose best they crawled upon the boxes and selected suitable places to sleep during the night.

Everything went without incident to be mentioned until they reached Glencoe where the train stopped to take water. It was then dark and Mr. Moes tells us that while the train was standing four men climbed upon the car and not noting their presence crawled down again and walked toward the rear of the train.

When the train left Glencoe the boys "turned in" for the night. Alfred lying on a box crosswise of the car while Clayton lay lengthwise with his feet perhaps five or six feet from Alfred's head. They hadn't gone more than five or six miles when these men returned, coming in over the end of the car back of Alfred.

As they approached, Alfred remarked that it was a chilly evening, but they made no response. They walked around Alfred and to a point about opposite Clayton's head and

turned around. A flash-light was thrown upon him and a big gun thrust out past the light far enough so he could see it and he was commanded to throw up his hands.

Right there is where the holdup man made the greatest mistake of his life, for in less time than it takes us to tell it two bullets were in his body, and the leader, a giant weighing two hundred and fifty pounds, was dead.

Boys usually give up without much trouble, especially when a bad man behind a big gun is making the demand. But not so with young Moes. To give up without battle was the last thing he thought of and he reached for his gun, which by the way, as a 32 calibre Savage automatic loaded with eleven rounds of quick powder shells.

He was lying upon his right side and the gun was in an outside pocket of his mackinaw. He did not wait to raise to his feet or even sit up, but began shooting while resting upon his elbow. He shot for the man holding the flashlight. At the second shot the flashlight went out and the man went down and he turned the fire upon the other three who were shooting as fast as they could work their fingers in double action revolvers.

Clayton was murdered in cold blood, one of the bandits shot him as he lay asleep. Having subdued one, Moes turned to the other three and when the tenth shell "jammed" in his gun his four adversaries were either dead or wounded. When his gun no longer worked he used it in beating them up and when finally he lost it, he fought with his fists until overpowered and was forced to throw up his hands.

They secured his gold watch and forty dollars in money and when asked if he had anything more and he asked them how much they expected from kid.

Alfred had one consolidation while giving up his money that most of the bullets he had been shooting had "gone home" as one of the three was so badly wounded he couldn't take part and the other two remarked that both had been hit.

After taking his watch and money they began beating him up and had got him down. Seeing that they had him down and were liable to kill him he resorted to a little strategy by saying a brakeman was coming.

For an instant they relinquished their hold and he slid over the side of the car and was hanging by his hands when one of them struck one of his fingers with the butt of a revolver and mashed it to the bone. Here he let go to take chances with a train hitting up a thirty-mile gait.

He ran to a farm house half a mile away and called up the sheriff at Glencoe to head off the robbers and send a doctor to dress his wounds, he having been shot in the left arm and had two bad cuts about the head, besides many bruises received from jumping from the train, and both sheriff and doctor were with him within twenty minutes.

As soon as his wounds were dressed and he had taken an invoice of his chances for living after having four bandits empty their firearms at him and the brunt of vengeance from four murders he turned his attention to looking after Clayton, whom he knew was unarmed and up to that time did not know of his fate.

He called up the section foreman at Sumpter and asked if he wouldn't take his speeder and go over his section and search for his body, for he knew they would beat him up and throw him from the train.

The sheriff got busy on the phone and was not long in learning that the train had stopped at Hector on account of a hot box and notified the police to be on the lookout for holdup men on that train. The bandits too badly wounded to go further told Conductor

Nemec that they had been wounded and robbed by two men on the train and wanted a doctor.

Mr. Nemec told them to report the matter to the agent and about this time the sheriff's orders began to take affect on the Hector police who arrested the real robbers and locked them up. Search was made by the trainmen and the body of Clayton and the dead bandit were found.

Clayton was shot in the left side just under the shoulder. The bullet was a 32, very likely fired from a 32-20 colts revolver. It passed through both lungs and just over the heart. The bandit was shot in one hand and the right side of the neck, the bullet plowing its way upward into the brain.

One of the bandits was shot in the back, another lost all the fingers on one hand. We did not learn of the extent of the wounds of the fourth. One bullet plowed its way through the pocket in Alfred Moes' mackinaw.

It was found that of the nine shots Alfred fired, five of them hit. It was generally known that Alfred was a crack shot with both rifle and revolver, but nobody ever surmised that Dakota county had a twenty-one year-old boy who had the nerve to take his chances alone with four gunmen who follow the holdup game as a business.

We have him and the Tribune in this issue would be giving his portrait but for the fact every I. W. W. in the country would get to see it and he would have to go to the trouble of wiping out a dozen more before they really got the hunch that he was too quick for them, even with all chances against him.

The body of Clayton was brought to Lakeville Saturday evening and the funeral services were held on the lawn at the home on Tuesday afternoon, the church being too small to take care of the many who had gathered to express their sympathy to the sorrowing relatives, the services being conducted by Rev. Harvey of Farmington.

All the business houses were closed during the services and almost the entire population in and about Lakeville were present, many coming from Farmington, Rosemount and the Twin Cities.

Clayton Dunham was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Dunham and was born in Lakeville nineteen years ago. He was a young man of exceptionally good habits and of an inoffensive nature. His least thoughts were to harm anyone, let alone beating up and robbing as he was accused of doing by those who murdered him.

It was reported that Alfred had been arrested and would be compelled to stand trial for killing one of the bandits. He tells us he was not arrested, and we glean from other sources that the result of his work in rounding up this gang which has been operating between Farmington and Montevideo for some time was very gratifying to the officers and citizens of not only that part of the country but Farmington as well.

GEORGE STEVENS WOODRUFF, Lucy Ariail family line

Mr. George Woodruff, pioneer settler of Faribault, died on Wednesday, April 3, at his home in Stockton, California.

Mr. Woodruff was a resident of Faribault since 1855 and remained here until 1906, when they went to California to make their home. The following account of Mr. Woodruff is taken from the Stockton Daily Record:

After a useful and lovable life of nearly 93 years, George Stevens Woodruff passed away at the home of his son, Edgar Woodruff, 27 East Maple street, yesterday. Mr.

Woodruff was born in Southington, Conn., October 7, 1825. In Plainville Conn., July 4, 1847, while 22 years old he and Miss Sylvia Jane Dunham, 17 were united in marriage. They were the parents of nine children, four of which are still living. Last year they celebrated the seventieth anniversary of their marriage.

In 1855, Mr. and Mrs. Woodruff moved to Faribault, where they resided for 50 years. He followed masonry contracting and was a prominent builder at Faribault, constructing the court house and a large state institution for the deaf and dumb, besides many other splendid buildings.

During the Civil War he served his country in the legislature.

At the behest of their son, Edgar, Mr. and Mrs. Woodruff came to Stockton in 1906 to make their home with the latter. They are believed to have been the oldest married couple in California. Mr. Woodruff took great delight in gardening, and the result of his efforts was more than pleasing.

Besides his wife, Mr. Woodruff is survived by four sons, Junius W. of Tracy, Minn., George of Spokane, Wash., John, of Fargo, N. Dak., Edgar Woodruff, of Stockton, California.

SYLVIA JANE DUNHAM WOODRUFF, *Lucy Ariail's granddaughter* **Pioneer Resident Of The City Dies**

The following from the Evening Record of Stockton, Cal., tells of the death of a former Faribult resident, who was well known by many of the older residents of the city.

Mrs. Sylvia Jane Woodruff, a beloved resident of Stockton for the past eighteen years, passed away at the advanced age of 93 years and 4 months.

Mrs. Woodruff, a truly remarkable woman, active, alert and retaining her mental faculties until almost her last hour, was suddenly stricken yesterday morning. She had been up and enjoying the fresh air of the garden just the night before.

In 1917 Mrs. Woodruff and her life partner, George S. Woodruff, who preceded her in death by five years, celebrated the seventy-first anniversary of their marriage. At that time it was claimed that they were the longest married of any. They were married July 4, 1847, and became the parents of nine children, only three of whom survive.

Eighteen years ago the Woodruffs came to California from their old home in Faribault, Minn., where they had been pioneer. Born in Plainville, Conn., Mrs. Woodruff emigrated to Minnesota in 1855.

Deceased was the mother of Edgar Woodruff of Stockton, George Woodruff of Spokane and John Woodruff of North Dakota.

The funeral was held privately on Tuesday morning, June 26, at 19 o'clock from the chapel of B.C. Wallace.

Interment was made in Park View Cemetery.

SYLVIA COWLES DUNHAM, Wife of Albert Dunham

ANOTHER PIONEER GONE

Mrs. Sylvia Dunham died at the home of George Woodruff on Seventh street on Sunday last, in the 91st year of her age.

The funeral was held from the house Tuesday afternoon, the services being conducted by Rev. S. A. Wallace, and the burial took place in Oak Ridge cemetery.

Mrs. Dunham was the mother of Mr. Henry Dunham and the late Samuel C. Dunham, also of Mrs. George Woodruff. She came to Minnesota with her children in 1854 or '55, nearly forty years ago, and has resided here continuously ever since.

She retained her health and vitality to a remarkable degree for one so old and while her death may be attributed to old age, it was probably hastened by an attack of the prevailing epidemic.

HENRY DUNHAM, Lucy Ariail family line

Word was received in Faribault on Sunday of the death of Henry Dunham, at Spokane, Washington. Mr. Dunham was a former resident of Faribault, leaving here in 1906, to make his home in the west.

Deceased was born in Connecticut in 1825 and came to Faribault in the early fifties.

SAMUEL COWLES DUNHAM, Grandson of Lucy Ariail

Hon. Samuel C. Dunham died at his residence in this city on Sunday morning last, after a painful illness of several months, ending in pneumonia.

Mr. Dunham was widely known in the county, having been an early settler, and always taken an active part in public affairs. He was a native of Plainville, Conn., and came to Rice county about the year 1856, settling upon a farm northeast of Roberds lake, in the town of Wells. During the war he removed to Faribault.

In 1872 he was elected an alderman in the first city council in Faribault, which office he held two years. In 1873 he was elected a representative in the legislature, and subsequently filled subordinate positions in that body. In 1876 he was appointed chief of police by Mayor Nutting, which position he filled for several years very acceptably.

He possessed natural ability as a detective, and was very successful in ferreting out criminals. As an officer he was active, vigilant and untiring in the discharge of his duties. He also filled the position of deputy sheriff several terms. His last official position was deputy oil inspector, which he held for two years ending last spring.

Mr. Dunham was an active politician, strongly attached to the principles of the Republican party, and whether working for his party, or serving the public in an official capacity, he was indefatigable in the discharge of every obligation of duty.

He was a useful citizen and enjoyed the esteem of a very large circle of friends.

He married after coming to Minnesota Miss Augusta Recor, who survives him. He leaves three sons, viz. Rufus C., Charles H., and Phineas Dunham, and one daughter, Eva, who is married to C. W. Newell, and reside in Shakopee. Deceased also leaves an aged mother, one brother, Henry Dunham, and a sister, Mrs. George S. Woodruff.

He was foreman of Engine Co. No. 1, at the time it was disbanded. The flag of the engine house was displayed at half-mast in memory of the deceased and delegates from the several companies attended the funeral and acted as a guard of honor in escorting the remains to the cemetery.

The funeral ceremonies, which were numerously attended, took place at the residence of the deceased yesterday at 10 a.m. Rev. E. Gale, of the Congregational church officiating. The pallbearers were O. S. Blake, B. F. Straub, J. B. Gwathmey, Isaac Anderson, J. J. Van Saun, and S. P. Wall.

The remains were interred in Oak Ridge Cemetery.

LEROY A. WOODRUFF, Lucy Ariail family line

FATAL ACCIDENT

Leroy Woodruff is Killed by the Accidental Discharge of his Gun.

Last Sunday evening about 9:15 Leroy Woodruff was fatally shot while riding in a wagon with Leo Stehly near the Grant farm north of the city. In the afternoon Leroy Woodruff, Leo Stehly and William Goblike, paddled down the river in canoes to the vicinity of Scott's mill, but the current being very swift they became fatigued upon the return trip and left their canoes in the river near the Grant farm and returned to their homes for a conveyance.

After supper Woodruff and Stehly returned with a wagon to bring in the canoes taking with them a shot gun which Woodruff loaded as they rode along.

After leaving the road they were driving across a field in the direction of the river when the gun, which Woodruff was holding between his knees, with the muzzle toward him, slipped forward and was discharged.

The charge of shot entered the groin and ranging upward severed the femoral artery and badly lacerated the colon and intestines, also perforating the stomach and lungs.

Stehly at once drove to the Grant farm house but finding no one at home drove to the residence of F. Mandell. A physician was called but did not arrive until after death, which occurred about half an hour after the accident.

Coroner Ray held an investigation and after examining the witnesses decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

Leroy was a son of John Woodruff formerly of this city, but for several years has made his home with his grandfather, G. S. Woodruff, who lives near the water works on Seventh Street.

The funeral is to be held at the residence of G. S. Woodruff at 10 o'clock this morning, Rev. J. H. Albert officiating, and burial will be in Oak Ridge cemetery.
